Introduction

"They should do something" – a phrase you hear all too often. When I became a councillor, I discovered just who "they" are and what "somethings" need to be done. Parish councils are the lowest level of administration and deal with the most minor items. It's playgrounds, open spaces, allotments, halls, local liaison. It all sounds very mundane – and it is.

But.

In time, I realised that a good parish council provides the backbone of the local community. We provide the places for other local groups and individuals to use. We help them plan what they want to do. We facilitate events. In Purley we provide a wide set of public spaces – the Goosecroft for football, tennis & cricket, Trentham's Bowling Club, the impressive play area at Bucknell's Meadow. We also have the Barn – a stunning and much-admired facility that's heavily used, Purley Sports & Social Club and the Burial Ground. We are very lucky.

Coming from the private sector what strikes you is how long it takes to do anything – years in many cases. This all requires commitment and planning. Purley is in a much better position than many other councils. The introduction of a full-time Clerk three years ago, firstly Chris Thompson and now Sharon Way, has made an enormous positive difference to continuity and administration. The office has also been strengthened and works wonders. We have a full set of 13 Councillors, and we all try and work together. We are non-political, at least at parish level. The amount of effort and unremitting attention to detail put in by the staff and the councillors amazes me.

I've lived in Purley for over 40 years, and still work as a geo-scientist in oil exploration. Outside work, we do a lot of walking, and I'm also a volunteer for the Outreach Post Office at the Barn and treasurer of the Community Shop team. For the first 30 years I spent a lot of time commuting and wasn't involved. Four years ago, working from

home, I had time to join the Council. I now chair the Finance Committee and the Emergency Group. I am also on the Recreation and Village Amenities Committees.

The Finance Committee is relatively new, and we aim not only to monitor current finances but also at long- and medium-term costs and plans. These days any new project or maintenance costs a small fortune – these must be planned and funded well in advance. The Emergency Group supports the Flood Wardens and other local bodies – it's mainly a liaison body but we were a major source of local information in the January 2024 floods.

Sometimes it's hard to see the benefits – but when you see the 2022 Jubilee events (all organised by local people) many of them on Parish property with council assistance, the way everyone pulled together during the floods or watch families enjoying themselves at Bucknell's then it's all worth it.

Operation Grotto - Winter Burglary Campaign

Now is a good time to remind the community around some simple tips to help protect themselves becoming a victim of a burglary.

Top tips to remember:

- ouble check you've locked all your doors and windows before leaving
- keep bags and keys away from your letterbox or cat flap
- use a timer to automatically turn lights on
- double-lock any door
- make sure that any valuables are out of sight
- don't leave car documents or ID out
- in the evening, shut the curtains and leave lights on
- set your burglar alarm
- make sure the side gate is locked
- lock your shed or garage and make sure you bike is locked to a robust fitting bolt inside

Shop local this Christmas

If you do need to buy gift, think about shopping locally to save fuel and gives the independent businesses the support they need – remember to take your own bag of course. Can your food shopping be done locally? We have some great local shops in our area that offer interesting and unique options.

Use more sustainable wrapping

Tons of wrapping paper will be purchased and thrown out as much of it cannot be recycled (due to glitter and shiny bits). When wrapping, consider using recycled paper or get crafting with plain brown paper or leftover newspaper. Fabric is another way to wrap your gifts.

Support wildlife

Cold weather can make it hard for wildlife. Consider helping wildlife out by setting up a bird table and put out high-fat foods (sunflower seeds, peanuts, bird feed) for robins and other garden birds to keep them warm during winter nights. Remember to keep tables clean and topped up and away from predators. Keep clean water for drinking and bathing – the wildlife will appreciate this.

If your garden plants have fruit, berries, hips, seeds and nuts, they'll be a larder for birds - holly, hawthorn, ivy, rowan, honeysuckle and dogwood all provide tasty treats or attract tasty insects. Don't keep your garden too tidy – some mammals will be using leaves for warmth and shelter.

Be mindful

Whilst many of us try to make Christmas restful, it can be stressful with pressure of gift-giving, shopping and travelling. Be gentle to yourself, take yourself out for a mindful walk in our area – we are so close to nature with Sulham woods and the Thames on our doorsteps. Take the time out – take a deep breath of fresh air, focus on your breath, look around and enjoy the sounds of nature.

Refuse, reuse, recycle

The festive season is a time when we increase our waste with food, packaging and wrapping paper. A lot of packaging will be thrown away and not recycled, and the total amount of waste created at Christmas is estimated to exceed an incredible 5 million tons!

Consider reducing the mountain of food we see at this time of year – this saves money, reduces waste, and saves the packaging which is often astronomical. Can you make your own goodies that often taste better? Experiment with new recipes to use up food that would otherwise be wasted. Remember to leave some freezer space spare for any leftovers.

Use the food waste provision we have available, or if possible, compost what you can't use and use it on your garden later in the year, completing the cycle and returning the nutrients to nature.

Perhaps reduce unnecessary packaging, reuse existing materials, and try to ensure what we do throw away is properly recycled. Check out www.purleysustainability.co.uk/recyling for more information about options in West Berkshire.

You never know what you can find in charity shops - often worth a visit — the perfect gift may be there waiting! Perhaps consider buying a useful and sustainable gift — for example a reusable cup, or bottle, beeswax wraps, bird tables, bird feeders etc.






