### Planning Applications

West Berkshire Council invites Purley on Thames Parish Council to comment on planning applications within the parish. The Parish Council's input is not binding upon West Berkshire Council, but comments may be considered in reaching a decision.

You can also see the details of any planning application via the <u>Planning Portal</u> on the WBC website. If you scroll down to the bottom of the Planning Portal webpage you will find a map showing recent planning applications in WBC. You can zoom in on the map to just see Purley on Thames. Also, an orange notice should be displayed at the boundary of any property/location subject to a planning application.

Any individual can comment on a planning application, both for and against, direct to WBC by <u>email</u>.

The Parish Planning Committee meets about every two weeks. The meeting is open to the public and there is opportunity for you to comment on any particular application. To see the agenda for the next meeting, which details the planning applications to be considered, see <u>Planning Committee meeting</u>.

West Berkshire Council has introduced a free online service to allow residents to check to see if planning permission is required for any possible building alterations. This service will make it easier for residents to understand if they need to submit a planning application for items such as solar panels, loft conversions, adding an outbuilding or adding a dropped kerb. You can access this new service on the West Berkshire Council "Do I need Planning Permission?" webpage. West Berkshire Council also offer planning pre-application advice service for which a fee is chargeable. #### **Purley Sustainability Group**

We will start by wishing everyone a Happy New Year! We also thank the residents of Purley who helped us with the Purley Litter Pick on 4<sup>th</sup> January 2025. It was cold, but it was dry! We go some steps in, we made new friends, got fresh air and made Purley look more attractive.

We walked Goosecroft, Beech Road, Glebe Road, Westbury Lane, Purley Lane, Colyton, Purley Rise, Sherwood Rise, Bowling Green Lane, Wintringham Way, the railway paths, the alleyways and footpaths and behind the bus stops and collected a staggering number of rubbish bags – about 20!

We picked up general sweet wrappers, cigarette ends, bottles, clothing, takeaway containers, wrappers, stationary, broken umbrellas, amongst other things - some particularly unpleasant unfortunately.

It is so sad that there was so much litter in our lovely village, but we must think what if we didn't pick it up and left it, what damage does it cause?



Village will look awful – no one likes seeing rubbish. Not only that, but we also risk more fires.



Litter can block drains, which can contribute to waterlogging – we have enough water problems as it is, so reducing this can only be a positive.



Wildlife - litter can look like food, causing problems for animals which then eat plastics and other rubbish, instead of energy-rich foods they need to survive. Plastics may cause choking, airway or stomach obstruction and can ultimately lead to death. Equally worrying is the tiny, but deadly microplastics that build up in the bodies of smaller animals, impacting many more along the food chain.



Animals will search for food, so finding empty food containers can act as a deadly trap. Sharp objects like hard plastics, glass and metals can cause cuts and wounds, which can lead to infection and cause further harm. Things like chewing gum could mean birds being unable to fly due to gum being stuck in their feathers.



Litter may harbour disease that can be harmful when ingested or released into our soils and rivers. The chemicals that leach from microplastics into the environment or animals who ingest them are invisible to us yet cause so many other health problems.

#### What can we do about it?

- Be careful not to drop litter in the first place take your rubbish home or use the litter bins that are located around the village.
- Educate others about the impacts of litter and encourage them to follow your example
- Check your recycling secure it reducing the possibility of the wind blowing it away. Use the recycling options we have available in West Berks to ensure correct disposal of items.
- Think about using items that can be used over and over instead of purchasing single use plastic items
- Take part in more litter picks:
  - On your own when you walk (ensuring your own safety of course).
