Introduction

Hello

My name is Graham Rolfe, and while I was born in Carmarthen, Wales, I spent the first 16 years of my life in London. At 18, I headed for the bright lights of Manchester and studied at the University of Salford, graduating with a degree in Electronic Engineering. I am now also a Chartered Engineer (CEng) and Fellow of the Institute of Engineering and Technology (FIET).

My first job was with BT at their headquarters in central London. I then moved to City of London Telephone Area where I was responsible for managing the installation team covering the square mile on the City of London. Later, promotion led to managing the provision of special services for the whole City of London Area.

It was during this time, in August 1981, that my wife, Margaret, and I moved to Purley on Thames attracted by the good transport links to London; we have been living in the same house since then.

I then moved within BT to Reading, working in the Friar Street offices where I was responsible for all customer field operations in the Thameswey District.

I left BT in the late 90's and moved to work for a Consultancy firm based in Marlow, working with a number of private telecoms companies looking at aspects of their customer service operations. This led to me becoming the Chief Technical Officer for a startup telecoms company.

Looking to keep occupied, I finished my working career as a laboratory technician at Theale Green School's Chemistry department.

I was a founder member of the Silver Surfers Computer Club that ran at the Barn for several years and introduced many to the pleasures, or not, of using a computer and surfing the internet. Sadly, after Covid, the costs of running the club became such that it was no longer financially viable. I am now the convenor for the Reading U3A Computer Club.

Eighteen years ago, I joined Purley on Thames Parish Council and over the years, have been Chairman of the Recreation and Planning Committees, Vice Chairman of the Parish Council for 6 years and Chairman of Council since May 2023. Currently, I am also Chairman of the Memorial Hall Trustees and Chairman of the Friends of Duchess of Kent Hospice.

Reporting problems

West Berkshire Council deal with the resolution of all sorts of problems from potholes, dog fouling, streetlights, graffiti, etc. You can report any issues that you have online via the WBC website. Just follow this link: Problem Reporting.

Planning Applications

West Berkshire Council invites Purley on Thames Parish Council to comment on planning applications within the parish. The Parish Council's input is not binding upon West Berkshire Council, but comments may be considered in reaching a decision.

You can also see the details of any planning application via the <u>Planning Portal</u> on the WBC website. If you scroll down to the bottom of the Planning Portal webpage you will find a map showing recent planning applications in WBC. You can zoom in on the map to just see Purley on Thames. Also, an orange notice should be displayed at the boundary of any property/location subject to a planning application.

Any individual can comment on a planning application, both for and against, direct to WBC by email.

The Parish Planning Committee meets about every two weeks. The meeting is open to the public and there is opportunity for you to comment on any particular application. To see the agenda for the next meeting, which details the planning applications to be considered, see Planning Committee meeting.

West Berkshire Council has introduced a free online service to allow residents to check to see if planning permission is required for any possible building alterations. This service will make it easier for residents to understand if they need to submit a planning application for items such as solar panels, loft conversions, adding an outbuilding or

adding a dropped kerb. You can access this new service on the West Berkshire Council "Do I need Planning Permision?" webpage.

West Berkshire Council also offer planning pre-application advice service for which a fee is chargeable. More information about this can be found on the West Berkshire Council's <u>pre-application advice service</u> webpage.

How can we be more sustainable when we go on holiday?

Purley sustainability has in the past, provided ideas and tips and hints for sustainability in the home and garden (can be found www.purleysustainability.co.uk/sustainhome), but as we edge towards holiday season, we thought we would give you some tips.

- Making a Booking there are so many ways to book holidays but spend a few minutes looking at the operations and try to select tour operators that invest in the local communities and try and use sustainable accommodation. Do your research ahead to ensure you are using reputable companies.
- **Travel responsibly** Use most appropriate method of transport if you can, use public transport as much as possible. It may even be more fun to explore the local area using local transport or on foot once you arrive.
- Pack Light check what your holiday accommodation has already provided so you do not need to take extra items, which add unnecessary weight. This may also save you money and avoid extra baggage fees. If you only take what you need, your case will be lighter, and journey will be more comfortable. Be ruthless and ask yourself do I need ten t-shirts for a week? Do I need a litre of shampoo? Many of us will often return with half the case of clothes unworn or items not even removed from the case! Remember to pack your reusable shopping bag to use when away.
- Try to use Environmentally Friendly Travel Products check the labels if you can. There are some items that are better than others.
- Think ahead and try to use reusable containers and bottles. Many holiday venues go through tons of disposable paper plates, cutlery, and cups – try to limit if you can.
- Before you leave the home, think about the Power used at home turn off
 those appliances that are not in use turn off the standby buttons, unplug the
 items that just display with a clock, like the microwave for example. Unplug the
 charger cables for safety reasons.
- Reduce food waste have a good think and try and only buy what you need
 when away. Holidays are a wonderful time to have the treats, but it loses appeal
 if there are too many that end up wasted. Before you leave, try, and use up food
 you already have to limit food waste. There are great recipes that focus on using
 up "bits."
- When you are away, think about limiting your energy use in the holiday accommodation ideas may be taking shorter showers, reducing air-

conditioning use, sensible/necessary towel use, unplugging electrical items when not in use, not leaving on standby etc.

- **Recycle** when you can whilst away from home look for the right bins to dispose of any waste.
- When away, **think about staying local** walk to the local shops and restaurants rather than using cars. You will also be giving the local economy a bit of a boost.
- Think twice about **holiday gifts** if a gift is necessary, could it be reusable and kinder to the environment?
- Try out **eco-friendly, outdoor activities** that can be fun and rewarding and embrace the fresh air and the views. They may even save a bit of money. Do remember to protect yourself from the sun.
- **Respect nature** as you would do when at home, never drop litter, (always use bins or take away with you) stick to established footpaths, respect wildlife and leave nothing behind except footprints and memories.

Finally – enjoy the holiday, reconnect with yourself and travel companions, take deep breaths and enjoy the different views and perspectives. We know we cannot do everything, but small steps make an enormous difference.


