# **Project Purley – VE 80 Celebration Event**

# 5 May 2025



About eighty Project Purley members, members of the community and guests attended Project Purley's VE 80 event in the Barn on 5<sup>th</sup> May. The Barn was festooned with bunting for the occasion and the tables decked with union jack tablecloths and poppy table centres. Wartime recruitment posters decorated the walls and the between exhibition display boards. In the background – music and on the screen in the gap between the talks – images of the war from around the world.

The afternoon comprised of an exhibition on Purley during the war, a talk in two halves by local historian, Mike Cooper, on why Germany lost the war in 1945, tea and cake and during refreshments, live music from the period played on the keyboard by Chris Rayers.

We were delighted to be joined by some very special guests. Our MP Olivia Bailey and her father joined us for the first period, looking at the displays and memorabilia



tables and chatting with the attendees and event organisers. Olivia made a heartfelt short speech and clearly enjoyed the occasion as the very next day she raised a point in the Houses of Commons about the fantastic work of local community groups across the county who were organising VE 80 events, including Project Purley, whose event she had attended the previous day. We even got recorded in the Hansard transcript for the day. A first for the Society and something very different for the archive.

Graham Rolfe, chairman of both the Parish Council and the Memorial Hall Trustees, also joined us and concluded the afternoon for us by lighting a lamp of peace.

Poignantly, we were also joined by some of the descendants and relatives of those from Purley who had served or died, whose stories were told on boards around the room. A nephew and great niece of Edward Reed of Glebe Road came. Edward was a regular soldier who was taken POW when Singapore fell to the Japanese. He ended up in the workcamps on the notorious Thai-Burma railway where he died due to the atrocious living and working conditions. Edward was one of two Purley men who died in Japanese camps during the war.

The daughters of Ernest Beswick of The White House on Beech Road also joined us, travelling up from Kent and Hampshire for the occasion. Ernest moved to Purley to work for the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries in Reading and died in the People's Pantry bombings on 10 February 1943. The daughters, Gillian and Jane, were just four and two respectively when their father was killed. Eight members of the Stevens family came, three generations, the youngest just eleven. Patrick Stevens, their father, grandfather or great grandfather, was one of three brothers who all served in the war, Patrick in the RAF. He ended up as a POW to the Germans at Stalag Luft III, the camp from where the "great escape" happened – immortalised in the book by Paul Brickhill and the film of the same name. Patrick was part of the team who organised the tunnelling but wasn't one who managed to escape by the tunnel on the night in question. Tragically of those who got out, only three made it back home and fifty were executed by the Germans in retribution for their actions.





Other boards told of the home front in Purley, of rationing, the various war work, including the making of parts for spitfires at Purley Garage, the growth of the River Estate, evacuees, and the continual fund

raising which went on. Alongside the display boards, we also had tables of memorabilia provided by David Downs and Rita Denman which proved to be of great interest and provoked memories with some present.

Overall, I hope that we did Purley's wartime community justice and celebrated their courage, endurance and community spirit. Project Purley's archive of Purley during the war has grown over recent years but is by no means complete. So, if anyone reading this has any memories of Purley during this time we would love to listen to your stories. ## Reporting problems

#### **Planning Applications**

West Berkshire Council invites Purley on Thames Parish Council to comment on planning applications within the parish. The Parish Council's input is not binding upon West Berkshire Council, but comments may be considered in reaching a decision.

You can also see the details of any planning application via the <u>Planning Portal</u> on the WBC website. If you scroll down to the bottom of the Planning Portal webpage you will find a map showing recent planning applications in WBC. You can zoom in on the map to just see Purley on Thames. Also, an orange notice should be displayed at the boundary of any property/location subject to a planning application.

Any individual can comment on a planning application, both for and against, direct to WBC by <u>email</u>.

The Parish Planning Committee meets about every two weeks. The meeting is open to the public and there is opportunity for you to comment on any particular application. To see the agenda for the next meeting, which details the planning applications to be considered, see <u>Planning Committee meeting</u>.

West Berkshire Council has introduced a free online service to allow residents to check to see if planning permission is required for any possible building alterations. This service will make it easier for residents to understand if they need to submit a planning application for items such as solar panels, loft conversions, adding an outbuilding or adding a dropped kerb. You can access this new service on the West Berkshire Council "Do I need Planning Permision?" webpage.

West Berkshire Council also offer planning pre-application advice service for which a fee is chargeable. More information about this can be found on the West Berkshire Council's <u>pre-application advice service</u> webpage.

## **Purley Sustainability Group**

PSG had a great Annual General Meeting on 7th May 2025 – we enjoyed a very interesting talk from Wild Tilehurst. They are a local group formed last year, with aims to support, protect and increase Tilehurst's biodiversity, promoting awareness of wildlife in local areas, identification, surveying and recording. They share their knowledge and encourage wildlife experiences and sightings.

Wild Tilehurst shared the activities they have been doing since they formed - Bat walks, Moth trap evenings, Identification walks: birds, invertebrates, flora, fungi, trees, mindfulness, Community Nature Fair, Citizen Science e.g. FIT count, and they have partnered with the local 12th century church to manage, improve biodiversity and hold surveys and events on their land. We all learned so much and PSG look forward to collaborating closely with them in the future.

In addition, Wild Tilehurst shared what they had planned which we are all excited about - More Bat Walks which would be in Purley, and a fascinating Worm Charming event – best we all get practicing!

Wild Tilehurst share all their events and PSG will ensure that they are also shared in Purley.

PSG took everyone through the plans and appointed the committee for the coming year.

We enjoyed some wonderful local cheese from The Cheese Shop in Pangbourne and had some lovely local wines and beers – a particular favourite was the red wine from Wallingford, purchased from Waitrose.

Our thanks go to everyone who attended the AGM and to everyone who supported the planning and organising.
