Local News

Reporting problems

West Berkshire Council deal with the resolution of all sorts of problems from potholes, dog fouling, streetlights, graffiti, etc. You can report any issues that you have online via the WBC website. Just follow this link: Problem Reporting.

Planning Applications

West Berkshire Council invites Purley on Thames Parish Council to comment on planning applications within the parish. The Parish Council's input is not binding upon West Berkshire Council, but comments may be considered in reaching a decision.

You can also see the details of any planning application via the <u>Planning Portal</u> on the WBC website. If you scroll down to the bottom of the Planning Portal webpage you will find a map showing recent planning applications in WBC. You can zoom in on the map to just see Purley on Thames. Also, an orange notice should be displayed at the boundary of any property/location subject to a planning application.

Any individual can comment on a planning application, both for and against, direct to WBC by email.

The Parish Planning Committee meets about every two weeks. The meeting is open to the public and there is opportunity for you to comment on any particular application. To see the agenda for the next meeting, which details the planning applications to be considered, see Planning Committee meeting.

West Berkshire Council has introduced a free online service to allow residents to check to see if planning permission is required for any possible building alterations. This service will make it easier for residents to understand if they need to submit a planning application for items such as solar panels, loft conversions, adding an outbuilding or adding a dropped kerb. You can access this new service on the West Berkshire Council "Do I need Planning Permision?" webpage.

West Berkshire Council also offer planning pre-application advice service for which a fee is chargeable. More information about this can be found on the West Berkshire Council's <u>pre-application advice service</u> webpage.

Project Purley



Along The Thames and Railway from Tilehurst through Purley – a talk by Gordon Adams

Friday 21st November

7.30pm

The Large Barn, Goosecroft, Purley on Thames

Members free, non-members £5

This talk will initially look at the appointment of the Thames Commissioners to improve navigation on the River Thames, resulting in the building of the pound lock at Purley and the introduction of a horse ferry to overcome a gap in the towpath. It will then move on to the coming of the railway and the later opening of Tilehurst Station. We will then look at the links between the GWR and leisure boating on the River Thames, and end by looking at more recent changes to the railway through Purley on Thames.

Guests and visitors very welcome. Membership of the Society costs just £26 for two people at the same address or £18 for one person and lasts until the end of December 2026.



I think it's fair to say that in the history of PSG over the last five years, we've never had such a busy month!

We kicked things off with the community lunch, where almost 70 people gathered to enjoy a feast prepared with produce from the allotments. Just days later, a few committee members attended the BBC Make a Difference awards ceremony, where we were proud to receive a Highly Commended Award. While recognition is always encouraging, it's a reminder that the real heart of community work isn't about awards—it's about the difference we create together. Every step forward, big or small, helps us build something meaningful. PSG is deeply grateful for the encouragement and support of our community, and we remain motivated to keep working toward a more sustainable future. Some of you may also have caught Richard Coates talking about PSG on Radio Berkshire earlier this month!

We had the monthly Repair Café at the Mad Duck, and our volunteers thankfully repaired the elastic strips on our gazebo roof following the gusty winds at the lunch! The next evening, we joined Wild Tilehurst and around 30 residents for a Bat Walk near the lock. We were lucky enough to see Soprano Pipistrelles swooping gracefully over and under the little bridge by the fish pass. It was a magical evening, and we're thankful to Wild Tilehurst for hosting—check our website for details of future Bat Walks. On Saturday 20th September, our allotment volunteers rolled up their sleeves for a working party. Jobs included clearing beds, emptying compost bins, tidying plots, and checking equipment. This was the first of several sessions, so if you'd like to get involved, head to our website for details of other sessions.

Sunday 21st September, we teamed up with PAWS for a fantastic Apple Pressing Day. Blessed with sunshine, the event drew families, friends, and neighbours of all ages. Everyone brought along apples—an amazing variety!—and the press was in constant use (with just a couple of quick repairs thanks to the ever-handy Repair Café volunteers). The waste was barrowed to Whitchurch allotments for composting, and countless bottles were filled with delicious, fresh apple juice. By the end, the area was spotless, with everything tidied away.


